HISD's policy goals as it relates to days of instruction according to the Apollo 20 Project Fact Sheet are:

- Add 5 additional days in 2010-2011 and 10 additional days in 2011-12
- 4:30pm M-Th; 7:30am to 3:30pm Fri Increase the length of the day from on average 7 hours to 9 hours; from on average 8am to 3pm to 7:30am to

additional equivalent days of instruction As illustrated herein, under current school start law (4th Monday in August) HISD can obtain between 46 and 54

HOW CAN APOLLO OBTAIN 46 TO 54 DAYS OF INSTRUCTION?

- Under current Uniform School Start Law
- Apollo's lengthening of school day, to 7:30am to 4:30pm M-Th; 7:30am to 3:30pm on Fri, is equivalent to adding 33 to 40 days of instruction
- 0 Ending Apollo Fridays at 4:30pm (1 hour later, the same time as M-Th) offers HISD the opportunity to add 4 days of instruction
- 0 Example Calendar shows how HISD can add up to 9 days of instruction
- HISD/Apollo has the local flexibility to achieve between current 174 days and total equivalent days of instruction of 220 to 228 days

WHY UNIFORM SCHOOL START DATE IS GOOD PUBLIC POLICY?

- Uniform School Start Date reflects the State's balance of maximizing economic activity to generate state and local tax revenue with responsibility to fund a system of public free schools
- A Uniform school start date is equitable to all students in Texas
- It prevents the "arms race" from starting early for athletics or to gain advantage over other districts or schools in teaching to the TAKs test
- 0 It provides a uniform basis for measuring district and campus level performance across the state adding to comparability
- District and campus cost/academic achievement comparison allows the legislature to determine if the issue is with the administration, teachers or the students
- It establishes the basis for determining what policies / "best practices" are really working efficient system of public free schools which in turn provides the information you, Members of the legislature, need to run an
- A uniform end date would enhance the state's ability to establish comparability among schools
- Uniform School Start Date (4th Monday in August) is good Public Policy
- Again, UNDER CURRENT Uniform School Start LAW HISD has the Local Control / flexibility to achieve total equivalent days of instruction of 220 to 228 days

- Interesting since the Comptroller's 2005 Fiscal Note clearly states there is a statewide impact
- And, if Houston is the Texas' largest city (Houston-Sugarland-Baytown account for 33% of state GMP) how can there be no impact?
- Total economic activity for 2 weeks in August is now about \$1billion
- Houston represents roughly 1/3 or \$333 million in economic activity
- I do not know how anyone can say there is no impact
